## Fall Festival

Our Second Annual Fall Festival is just around the corner.

This year's featured artist is Douglas Rubio.

Douglas Rubio is recognized as an outstanding performer on the classical guitar. His brilliant solo performances inspire standing ovations, and he is a gold medal chamber musician. The Santa Barbara News-Press praised his playing for its "considerable sensitivity and bravura." His programs offer a fascinating mix of the old, the new, the traditional, and the off-the-beaten -path.

Doug is currently Associate Professor of Classical Guitar at the State University of NY at Pottsdam. He has performed throughout the United States as a soloist and chamber musician. and has been the featured concerto soloist withthe Monticito (California) and Pennsylvania Center chamber orchestras. His Avalon Guitar Duo won First Prize in the 1985 GFA International Duo Guitar Competition, and is featured on the compact disc GFA Winners Circle 1982-93. Rubio performs frequently with Sweet, Fair & Wise, a trio of flute, tenor voice, and guitar. His eclectic

background includes three years as a member of the Digital Arts Consort, a MIDI synthesizer ensemble. Rubio received his bachelor's degree from Universsity of California at Irvine, and holds both Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in classical guitar performance from the University of Souther California, where he studied with Spanish virtuoso Pepe Romero. Prior to moving to Upstate New York, Rubio directed a very successful guitar program at Illinois State University.

We at CGSUNY are very excited to have Doug performing for us at the Festival. He will also be doing a Master Class for us on Sunday. Anyone interested in performing at the Masterclass with Doug is asked to contact us immediately to reserve space.

CGSUNY member Joel Brown is a long-time artist -in-residence at Skidmore College, and is an active performing artist in the groups: Tritonis and Triple Play. Joel Brown will lecture and perform with Tritonis at the GFA (Guitar Foundation of America)"Sun Waves Guitar Fest 2002" in Miami on Friday Oct. 18. Tritonis will be performing at the Ithaca College Winter Guitar Festival Feb. 22, 2003. Joel brings great guitarists to Skidmore's Filene Recital Hall each year for performances and master classes, and we will let our members know about these events as soon as possible.

Sten Yngvar Isachsen teaches classical guitar at SCCC (Schenectady County Community College) and University at Albany. Recently Sten has been performing with Musicians of Ma'alwyck, with violinist Ann-Marie Barker-Schwartz and cellist Petia Kassarova. They have upcoming performances: Oct. 15 - Troy Savings Bank Music at Noon (free); Nov. 12 at 8 p.m. at the University of Albany Performing Arts Center, Musicians of Ma'alwyck are

string-trio-in-residence this season at University at Albany. Sten notes that the SCCC Student Guitar Ensembles will perform Nov. 25 at 7:30 p.m. at Taylor Auditorium at SCCC.

Fred has taken about 8 years away from performing while he went to medical school and was a resident at Albany Medical Center. Fred studied classical guitar at the University at Buffalo and was a performing artist and guitar teacher in the Tampa Fla. area before moving to Albany.

Cathedral Music, a great guitar shop in Troy, continues to carry some very good classical guitars. I was recently visiting and tried a very nice Larrivee (Canadian), and a Lucida (Spain). Klem often has Kenny Hill classical guitars in his shop; the Munich model is very popular. I have tried the Kenny Hill Munich and Ruck models in his shop in the past (the Ruck is the one with extra sound holes). Steel string players should make a pilgrimage to his shop - it is definitely Mecca!

I will end with my own artistic endeavors - in March 2002 I released a CD "Studies, Memories & Moons" with solo guitar works of Leo Brouwer and Jose Luis Merlin and "Three Moon" for guitar and cello by David Leisner. Cellist Lisa Nielson and I have also been performing "Reflexoes No. 6" by Jaime Zenamon, and we have named our duo "Spiral". Spiral will be performing Dec. 8 at Caffe Lena, part of the Sunday Chamber Music series. I will be performing solo guitar at the CGSUNY Fall Festival Oct 12, and Nov. 19 at the RPI C+CC. "Norwich Guitar
Success"
(using CGSUNY as a
Guitar Networking
Resource)

The first annual Norwich Guitar School, a presentation of the Chenango County Council of the Arts, is now history. Players from an area covering Buffalo to Albany to Scranton were targeted in a large-scale promotional campaign. Guitar enthusiasts from age 14 up to 60 were attracted to this hands-on seminar, held at the Arts Council facility in Norwich NY. from all points in New York State, including Messina, Tonawanda, Ithaca, Oneonta, and Millville, PA.

The content of NGS is designed to introduce players to a more "holistic" approach to playing. The idea is that all guitar playing is related; that all styles rely on a common set of techniques. The real challenge was to find people who not only

understand and practice this concept, but who are also able to pass it along to others in an understandable, useable manner. In other words, teachers.


As a member of the Classical Guitar Society of Upstate New York, I have made the acquaintance of players from all over the region; players who are well-versed in the classical style and repertoire, but who also are knowledgeable in a wide range of guitar playing and related topics.

My teaching staff was made up of Dennis Turechek, who teaches guitar at State University at Oneonta, and at Hartwick College. He is also a founder and Director of CGSUNY, I was able to obtain the expert services of Jim Adams, owner of The Guitar Clinic in Oneonta, who also happens to be the Treasurer for CGSUNY. Another special treat; Sal

Salvaggio gave our students a demonstration on the lute and the Baroque guitar. Sal is a fine classical guitarist, and a teacher of vocal music at Cooperstown High School. He is also an active member of CGSUNY. Other instructors included Chris Woodard, an excellent player and teacher from Ithaca NY, an Dan Lovett, owner of The Loft Audio Recording in Lansing NY.

## ZEN & THE ART OF GUITAR TUNING

There are many methods of tuning your guitar; some good, some bad and some adequate. The truth of the matter is that if it sounds pleasing to you and your audience it's OK.

There are two basic scales that are of concern; the Pythagorean scale and the equal temperament scale. The equal temperament scale is used to calculate the placement of frets on the guitar. Therefore, all fretted notes on the guitar belong to the equal temperament scale. All harmonics belong to the Pythagorean scale. The only notes that are common to both scales are unisons and octaves. The guitar cannot be correctly tuned by any method that includes comparing a fretted note with a harmonic that is not a unison or an octave (or a multiple of an octave)!

As an illustration, the note produced by the harmonic at the 7th fret is an octave plus a fifth above the open note. The harmonic at the 5th fret is two octaves above the open note. These two notes are incompatible, yet a common method of tuning is to compare the 5th fret harmonic with the adjacent string's 7th fret harmonic. This produces an error, which is multiplied as the method progresses across the fingerboard.

Three methods of tuning correctly are as follows:

Use an electronic tuner for all strings.

Once the correct pitch for one string is set, a good way to tune the others from it is by the 5th fret/4th fret method.

A third method comes from a data sheet produced by The Guild of American Luthiers. It is difficult to remember but works well.

LEGEND:  $\Leftrightarrow$  = harmonic; e.g.,  $12 \Leftrightarrow$  = 12th fret harmonic.

The schematics indicate to tune a string at the fret indicated with that indicated directly above or below it.

What's good for the goose is not always good for the gander. As a result of equal temperament certain notes lose their quality or accuracy, and the tuning of the guitar always requires compromise. Once the instrument is tuned, most guitarists will tweak the tuning for certain notes to regain the lost accuracy in the key they will use. This is a matter of preference, training and ear. It may be argued that any method of tuning that sounds good to you and your audience, is good.

I'll try to come up with an even more esoteric subject for the next newsletter. Until then-PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE.
